

The Journey of Lent

Lent begins soon—March 2nd to be exact. Considering that we're still in the pandemic, Lent seems, frankly, redundant. Haven't these last two years

been grim enough? As a child, I had this idea that Lent was a time to suffer through, with the sense that the suffering itself is what made it good for us. It's no wonder that the late journalist H.L. Mencken rejected

those who rejected Puritan Lenten observers as those who were preoccupied with "the haunting fear that someone, somewhere may be happy"!

So why Lent? In many cultures there is an ancient custom of giving a tenth of each year's income to some holy use. For Lutherans and many other

Christian denominations, to observe forty days of Lent is to do the same thing with rough a tenth of each year's days. After being baptized by John in the

river Jordan, Jesus went off alone in the wilderness where he spent forty days facing up to who he was—and wasn't.

During this Lent, we will do much the same thing. We won't have to walk

through a desert. We don't even have to be good! But we will spend time in worship and in personal devotion facing up (like Jesus) to who we are, who we are not, and who Jesus is for all of us. That's not always easy. But if ashes are at the beginning of Lent, something like Easter can be at the end. New life, new hope; new you and new me;

happiness—all out of the goodness of God in Christ who died and rose for us.

After all, the word "Lent" comes from a Middle English meaning, "spring." word There's the story about a Lutheran who resolved not to drink beer during Lent. But this proved a too-daunting task and the man had to go to church with а weight on conscience—and perhaps with something convicting on his breath as well. But as he leaves worship one Lenten Wednesday and steps out into the warm mercy of a spring evening, he is reminded of the grace of God. Indeed, Spring-Lent-means that the sun shines longer and longer on the saints and sinners we all are. Thanks be to God.....and have a good Lent!

The Easy Yoke

2022 Lenten Wednesday Worship

"Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and I will give rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light."—Matthew 11:28-30

Lent is a 40-day period in the church's year in which we renew our commitment to Christian discipleship and respond to the call to follow Jesus Christ all the way to the cross so that, on Easter, we too might discover a new and transformed life that looks more like Jesus' own life.

Throughout the Wednesday evening Lenten services, we will be looking at the Beatitudes in Matthew—"Blessed are...."—provide a fabulous description of what this new character is that Jesus is building in all of our lives.



The framework for this series comes from Matthew 11. Jesus says, "Take my yoke upon you." Jesus suggests that the salvation and life that he offers us

does not remove burdens, but it gives us the right burdens to bear—the same burdens that Jesus bore and the burdens that change us. In baptism, the Holy Spirit binds us to Jesus Christ. To be yoked to Jesus means to travel with him and, along the way, his life is developed within us. When we bear the burden of Christ, we find the blessings of the Beatitudes form in our lives.

We have an ongoing donation box in the Narthex beside the information kiosk for collecting "most wanted items" namely shampoo, liquid hand soap, laundry detergent, toothpaste and toothbrushes, baby wipes, personal care items, and dog and cat food. These items are always in short supply at VEAP.

Items are brought to VEAP as soon as the bin is filled and they are grateful for every item they receive.

A Special Effort: Welcoming Afghan Evacuee Families

Making New Homes in Minnesota

Over the next 2-3 months, there will be some 250 Afghan families arriving in Minnesota.

Having to quickly leave their home country, they come here with very little. They often have no money, nowhere to stay, and nothing to eat.

Beginning on the first Sunday of Lent, March 6, and continuing through Lent, we are joining the efforts of Lutheran Social Services of Minnesota and Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services in helping to provide basic necessities; food, clothing, medical care, and temporary housing. The needs are urgent.

Will you join us in welcoming Afghan evacuee families making a new home in Minnesota?

Over these next months, our children's

offering and the Wednesday Lenten worship offering will be given in support of our Church's effort. You can also help incoming Afghan families by offering them gift cards to Cub Foods, Aldi, or Visa so that they can purchase food while they wait for emergency government assistance.

2021 ELCA Good Gifts Recap

What a generous congregation! There were \$5,187 worth of ornaments on the Good Gifts Tree, and another \$1,000 worth of gifts that had been sent through our church office without ornaments, for a total value of \$6,187.

Our congregation loves goats: 32 goats this year...including a "Herd of Goats." Chicks came in second at 13; then 11 Pigs; 20 School Fees, Uniforms and Supplies, 1 for an entire

classroom; 5 Vaccinations for a child; 2 Roosters; 8 Honeybees; 5 Fruit tree seedlings; 4 Microloans for women; 1 Stocking a health clinic; 2 Latrines; 2 Stocka-backpack with food; 1 Bible; 1 Mosquito net; 1 Feed 50 at a soup kitchen; 1 Veggie Garden & Supplies; 1 Water filter; 2 Cows; 1 Seeds and gardening tools; 2 Water filters; 1 Feed a Refugee family for a week; 3 Nutrition for a child one year; 1 Community Garden; 1 Motor Bike for a

Pastor; and from our Sunday School 1 complete Fish Farm and share of another.

All these gifts are 'life giving/life saving,' and will keep on giving for years to come. Your gift, big or small, will make a difference. You made a difference and what a Christmas blessing that is. Thank you.

Children, Youth and Family News this Winter

During the season of Lent, the 40 days that precede Jesus' death and resurrection, many Christians around the world pause to take

an inward look at their faith and their relationship with the world. common tradition has been to give up something as a means of drawing closer to God. For example, you could give up using some or all social media if you felt

like it was distracting you from some of the more important aspects of your life. Conversely, others might take on a spiritual practice to help them grow in their faith—reading a verse or chapter of scripture every morning with breakfast, praying before dinner every night, etc.

In the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus gives a message commonly referred to as the "Sermon on the Mount," where he declares

a list of blessings. But, much to the surprise the people listening to him, the are blessings whom his people audience would not have expected—the humble, the persecuted, the grieving, the

peacemakers, the merciful.

Jesus did this as a promise of hope, but also as a reminder of God's reign here and now. Jesus sees us in our struggles and difficult situations, and promises salvation; Jesus sees us in our struggles and difficult situations, and assures us of his presence with us through them.

As we journey to the cross together this Lenten season, I invite you to consider the awe-inspiring reality of the Resurrection: that it is our inheritance as God's beloved children, and that God's love is, and always will be, for you.

And finally, as we receive this Resurrection blessing, Jesus gives us a direction as the Church: to share the blessing with others. May that can be your faith practice over the next 40 days—receive the blessing, and be a blessing. Amen!

An Interview with Marian Fronk

Marian Fronk and her husband, Bob, joined Peace in 2009. Now at age 94, Marian reflects on life and faith.

Marian was born in Minneapolis in the house that her father built. Marian met the kind and generous Bob Fronk through

friends. Before marrying, Marian stated that she wanted to complete her social work degree at the University of Minnesota and visit Norway, from which both of her parents had emigrated. Once she had her a degree in hand, Bob proposed honeymooning in Norway and plans fell into place. They were married in 1950 and embarked on a fourmonth honeymoon in Norway, meeting many relatives with whom Marian has maintained life-long connections.



Working in her field of study was put aside to raise four children, all of whom were baptized and confirmed as Lutherans.

At age 45, Marian went back to school to become an elementary school teacher and happily taught for many years at The Blake

School. At Friendship Village, where she now resides, she has even run into former students who have now become neighbors!

How has your faith changed during your life?

MF: My faith has helped give me good guidance, such as when my daughter, Mary, was sick with cancer and died on her 50th birthday. It was hard to say goodbye; I miss her every day. I had strong people around who helped me.

What are important life and faith lessons that you've learned?

MF: Have good friends and a good church, and be willing to admit that you are not right all the time!

I try to live so my children see that things change, but you still do what you need to do.

What are your favorite things about Peace Lutheran Church?

MF: Peace is a happy place with captivating sermons. I love the singing and the service.

Devotion: *Missing Pages?*

I was the guest preacher. I had returned to a congregation I once served. There were a few familiar faces and many good memories; I had looked forward to the day. And now I was preaching. The congregation seemed to be engaged. I thought I had begun well. I had some fairly funny jokes thrown in—and they even laughed!

I was moving along, making some point. And that's when things went south. I turned the page of my sermon manuscript and realized that the last two pages were missing. Tell a story like this to a group of preachers and it's like running your nails down a chalkboard; it's the stuff of preacher nightmares. I had left them on the printer in the church office.

I think that a similar sense of panic happened when the early Christians read Mark's gospel, the oldest gospel in our New Testament. The original manuscript ends with a small group of women that discover Jesus' tomb is empty, run away, as Mark reports, "for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid." That's it! Not exactly inspiring. In fact, Mark's ending made the early Christians panic, like the Gospel writer had lost the last few pages of his manuscript. Some were so worried about this that they added some other stories onto the end that finished the resurrection story nice and tidy.

But the Easter story doesn't end that way. The women are scared. Can you blame them? They had seen an empty tomb! Life was not over for Jesus or for them. Death had been defeated. Jesus was alive and out ahead of them we're told, on his way to Galilee. That's how the greatest story ever told ends. Pages missing? Maybe not.

Even as we head into Lent and Holy Week; even was we too might be afraid of all that is going on around and within us; it's good to be reminded once again: the story is not over! Jesus is on the loose! Death does not have the final word. Life will prevail. Good will overcome evil. Christ is risen! He is risen, indeed!
