Ongoing Offering Collection for Afghan and Ukrainian Refugees

Recently 250 Afghan families and individuals arrived in Minnesota. Having to quickly leave their home country, they came to the U.S. with very little and were in transition for months.

As we all know, on February 24, Russian forces invaded Ukraine, launching land, sea and air attacks. As a result, The UN estimates that 12 million people inside Ukraine will need relief and protection, while more than 4 million Ukrainian refugees may need protection and assistance in neighboring countries in the coming months.

During Lent, Peace joined the efforts of Lutheran Social

Services of Minnesota and Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services in helping to provide basic necessities; food, clothing, medical care, and housing for Afghan and Ukrainian refugees.

On Easter Sunday, Pastor Mark announced the total of the Lenten offering on behalf of Ukrainian refugees and the resettlement of Afghan families in Minnesota. The total was \$16,072.27!

We thank you for your compassion and your generosity toward immigrants and refugees.

The Director of the Home, Uklyn Hendricks, said that "our (good!) reputation preceded us" and we were the first church group to be allowed in since the pandemic began.

And, in spite of COVID constraints and heat, the group was very productive during our five days of work. We painted walls, curbs, and picnic tables, restored fencing, reinstalled a barrier, and built pallet gardens in two children's playgrounds.

Our thanks to Sue Larson and Andrea Larson; Nick, Emmy, Trevor and Ben Budz; Jason, Holly, Adam and Avery Rich; Tom Tisthammer and Michelle Johnson; and Marcie Horner for their service and sacrifice on behalf of Queen Louise. An Interview with Your New Council Members

What is one of your favorite things about Peace?

Jason Rich: One of the aspects I really appreciate about Peace is how open and welcoming the congregation is. We have an environment where it's incredibly easy, natural even, to start up a conversation with one of our members, even those you may not know well.

Kara Stender: I love that everyone is so friendly. I have made some wonderful lifelong friends since joining this church.

Adam Tschida: I really appreciate how Peace has made my family feel like part of the church's family. From the first service Angela and I attended many years ago, it seemed like such a natural fit. We very quickly developed a sense of belonging. That has carried through with our two kids, Addison and Wyatt - they have a place in the church. It is a great comfort to be part of something good and I think that is what continues to pull me towards Peace.

What would you tell a prospective visitor or member about Peace?

JR: It's a community where you can step away from the distractions and negativity we often encounter in daily life, and reconnect with something bigger and share that connection with some incredible people.

KS: Peace is a warm and welcoming environment to worship for all. It is also a wonderful community to help us teach our children about God's love.

AT: Peace accepting is an values congregation that fellowship, service, and families. If you are looking for a super-church where you can be a face in the crowd, keep looking. Our sanctuary seats a couple hundred, the pastor gives a fantastic sermon, and the coffee is pretty darn good. Services are Sundays at 9:30 - see you there.

How have you grown as a result of being a member of Peace?

JR: Being involved with Peace has helped me grow as a parent. Having the opportunity to connect with my kids through their confirmation education has provided a terrific vehicle to better understand their point of view on faith, and how we can shape that faith experience together.

KS: For the past several years I have been a Sunday School teacher. This has allowed me to grow my religious knowledge and my own faith and to strengthen my relationships with our youth.

AT: My wife and I were both hired as police officers right out of

It shifted our perspective and was a defining moment for both of us.

JR: An owl, as it represents patience and wisdom.
