"Dietrich Bonhoeffer: Pastor, Martyr, Prophet, Spy" Adult Education Hour Sunday, October 15, 2023

- II. Introduction
 - A. Who was Dietrich Bonhoeffer?
 - a. By way of introduction, I'm simply going to read to you the opening paragraph of his *Wikipedia* entry for some basic information about him.
 - i. Dietrich Bonhoeffer 4 February 1906 9 April 1945) was a German <u>Lutheran</u> pastor, theologian and anti-<u>Nazi</u> dissident who was a key founding member of the <u>Confessing Church</u>. His writings on Christianity's role in the secular world have become widely influential; his 1937 book <u>The Cost of Discipleship</u> is described as a modern classic. Apart from his theological writings, Bonhoeffer was known for his staunch resistance to the Nazi dictatorship, including vocal opposition to <u>Adolf Hitler</u>'s <u>euthanasia</u> program and genocidal persecution of the Jews. He was arrested in April 1943 by the <u>Gestapo</u> and imprisoned at <u>Tegel Prison</u> for one-and-a-half years. Later, he was transferred to Flossenbürg concentration camp.
 - ii. Bonhoeffer was accused of being associated with the 20 <u>July plot</u> to assassinate Hitler and was tried along with other accused plotters, including former members of the <u>Abwehr</u> (the German Military Intelligence Office). He was hanged on 9 April 1945 during the collapse of the Nazi regime.
 - B. Why take a couple of Sundays to reflect on Bonhoeffer's life and witness?

- a. So, over the years, I have heard a story about the Church in Hitler's Germany. That story went something like this.
 - i. Christians were overrun by Hitler's political power in the 1930's.
 - ii. Leading up to World War II, Hitler's hatred of Christianity led to the oppression of the Christian church and the closing of churches.
 - iii. And the Church was one of the few institutions that resisted Hitler.
 - iv. It was a story very much of the good people and the bad people. And the church was the good people and Hitler and his supporters were bad people.
- But that story changed for me. I have through the years discovered. In college. In seminary and onward. It's a more complex story.
 - i. Why was it. That in Hitler's rise to power, that Christians and the Church were overwhelmed?
 - ii. It turns out, that the relationship between Christianity and Nazism far differently than what I had originally heard.
 - iii. One of the hard things about looking back at this time is that we know how it went so wrong and how it turned out.
 - iv. But at the time, Hitler was seen as a kind of bumbling idiot that the German aristocracy thought that they were going to be able to manage and control if they allowed him to become chancellor.
 - v. And so we often sort of find it hard then to go back beyond that period and try to think about the fact that Hitler was just another politician.
 - vi. And another way of saying this maybe is how we would have viewed the situation had we been Germans living in the early 1930's?

- vii. How would we have thought what would we have believed about the crowds that were so willing to give this man their loyalty?
- c. What we may find is that Christianity in fact prepared the way for Hitler and that Christianity prepared the ground so that Hitler could build on almost 2 000 years of Christian tradition and practice to initially gain power.
 - i. He only turned on the Christian church when he realized it was not going to give him what he wanted, which was no criticism and complete obedience to his agenda.

C. What we're going to do

- a. Look at life of Dietrich Bonhoeffer through the eyes of one of his biographers, Eric Metaxas. Journalist, radio commentator. And author. Books about Martin Luther, *Letter to the American Church*, and this book, Bonhoeffer: Pastor, Martyr, Prophet, Spy.
- b. Four videos examining Bonhoeffer's life and thought.
- c. Today.
 - i. "What Is the Church?" you will think about what the church should really look like, forgetting tradition, and looking at what Jesus taught His apostles. (20 minutes)
 - ii. "Living in Christian Community," you will learn about New Testament Christianity and what it looks like to live this out as a community of believers. (23 minutes)

d. Next Week

- i. "Religionless Christianity," you will look at a negative religious faith—simply avoiding sin—as compared to the act of trusting and obeying God by putting your faith into action. (21 minutes)
- ii. Session 4, "**Come and Die**," you will get a vision, through Bonhoeffer's life in prison and, ultimately, his death in prison, of what it looks like to take up Jesus' cross to live in communion with him. (23 minutes)
