# Just the Beginning!

I am writing this column for the summer newsletter at the end of the Easter season, the day of the "Ascension of Lord." And as I think back to the wonderful music, Holy Week, the beautiful sanctuary, the gathered people of God, and the story of Jesus's resurrection, it strikes me that it's very easy to assume that the main part of the Biblical with story ends Easter. However, I would say that far from Easter being the end, it is really just the beginning.

It's the beginning of the spread of the good news that love is stronger than hate and life is stronger than death. It's the beginning of the message of hope that quickly spreads from Jerusalem to the four corners of the world. And it's the beginning of the mission and ministry of the church, a mission and ministry that stretches from Jesus' firstcentury disciples to Jesus' 21stcentury disciples here at Peace. What's amazing about all these beginnings is that they were all accomplished through the words, witness, and work of a few dozen people empowered by the Holy Spirit.

That's true! By the end of the story of Jesus told in the Gospels, there are about two dozen or so women and men followed who have Jesus through his ministry, who bailed out in fear during his crucifixion, who gathered in fear behind closed doors after his death, who were the first witnesses of the resurrection, and who were then sent to share the good news with they everyone met at Pentecost.

Think of that: if God used just a few dozen people to share the message of God's love in Christ so far and wide that over the centuries it literally changed the world, what might God do with and through the hundreds of disciples who are members of Peace?

Sometimes it's hard to imagine God working through ordinary people like us. Maybe you doubt that you're faithful enough, or holy enough, for God to work through. But when you read the Bible, you soon realize that God only works through ordinary people with all kinds of faults and flaws, just like you and me. So, again, what could God accomplish through you? And what could God accomplish through all of us together?

So let's dream of the difference we can make together. Dream of what Peace might become as we invite friends and neighbors to share the life and fellowship we have found here. And dream of the difference we can make in Bloomington and elsewhere through our own words. witness. and work empowered by the Holy Spirit. What we thought was an ending at Easter, is really just a beginning. May it be so for us!

Mark's goal is to give us a sense of the new thing God is doing in Jesus Christ and then takes us along with the disciples as Jesus proclaims and lives out the "kingdom of God." ## 2024 Synod Assembly Recap

On May 2-4, 2024, Pastor Mark and Pastor Joe along with Peace congregational delegate, Marcia Craig, attended the 2024 Minneapolis Area Synod Assembly at Lord of Life Lutheran Church in Ramsey, MN.

The annual assembly is a chance for representatives from across the synod's 137 congregations to come together for worship, learning, business, and occasional elections. This



year's assembly was unique in that it included an election for a new bishop of the Minneapolis Area Synod. After the nomination process began in February, seven candidates remained on the ballot; five rounds of

voting took place over the two days of the assembly.

Upon the election's conclusion, the Bishop-Elect is Rev. Jen Nagel, who currently serves as the lead pastor at University Lutheran Church of Hope in southeast Minneapolis. Bishop-Elect Nagel begins her new role on August 1.

Bishop Ann Svennungsen, who faithfully served our synod (and beyond!) for two six-year terms, will retire on July 31.

# Education Opportunity: "Powerful Tools for Caregivers"

"Powerful Tools for Caregivers" is an evidence-based curriculum developed in Portland, Oregon, and is a sixweek class series. In this series, caregivers come together to help navigate the challenging world of caregiving.

# Service & Mission

### Spotlight On....Loaves & Fishes



In this ongoing series, we highlight

an organization that Peace supports with your benevolence dollars through the Service & Mission Committee. In this issue we focus on Loaves & Fishes.

#### Why Does Peace Support Loaves & Fishes?

Loaves & Fishes' (L&F) mission is to provide healthy meals in areas where the need is greatest. Their vision is that all people regardless of socioeconomic, cultural, religious, or ethnic background deserve to meet their basic needs for food, dignity, and respect.

Their mission aligns with Peace's Service & Mission Committee who, on the congregation's behalf, serves in response to God's love to meet human needs.

#### What is Loaves & Fishes?

L&F started as a free meal program in 1982 with one dining site each in Minneapolis (St. Stephen's) and St. Paul (Dorothy Day Center). Today they provide thousands of meals daily across Minnesota, and are the largest open-to-the -public free meal program in the state. While staying true to their core mission they have cultivated new initiatives:

- Summer Food Service offered Program is in conjunction with the Minnesota Department of Education. L&F opens additional dining sites in the summer to accommodate students while school is out of session.
- Food Rescue Operation rescues food from partnering restaurants, grocery stores, cafeterias, and businesses, to distribute and repurpose into nutritious meals.
- Street Outreach brings healthy, mobile meals to urban locations for those who cannot get to the dining sites, including people who are unsheltered. homeless, in transitional housing, or struggle with reliable transportation.
- Farm For All supplies fresh produce directly to people or to add into the meals L&F provides.
- The HUB enables meal groups to affordably obtain food using L&F's infrastructure and food inventory. Some meals are served to the public; others are served as part of a closed in-house meal service.
- Advocacy: L&F shares resources with guests

including referrals for transportation, housing, health plans, volunteering, etc.

#### How is Loaves & Fishes Supported/Funded?

87% of revenue is from in-kind contributions; 5% from individuals, 4% from foundations.

95% of expenses are directly related to programs. The remaining 5% are costs related to administration and fundraising.

#### How Is Peace Currently Involved and How Does Your Offering Help?

Each month the Peace community donates through your offering, approximately \$850 to prepare and distribute a meal through L&F. We serve the 3<sup>rd</sup> Tuesday of every month at Christ the King Luth. Church in Bloomington. Some evenings we serve 80 meals, sometimes 200 meals.

#### How Can You Get Involved?

L&F has not resumed serving meals onsite at many of the meal sites. Some, including Bloomington's site at Christ the King, are a hybrid site—people can choose to eat onsite or, drive up and take the meal out.

# In Memoriam: Dave Sawyer



Our brother in Christ, David Sawyer, died on April 21<sup>st</sup> at the age of 83 and his funeral service took place at Peace on May 3<sup>rd</sup>.

There are many things to say about David Sawyer. He was smart—very smart. Dave passed up a full scholarship to the University of Chicago to study physics and instead went to St. Olaf, where he earned a double major in English and Philosophy. He went on to the University of Nebraska to earn his Masters' and his doctorate in 17<sup>th</sup> Century Literature. His Ph.D. thesis? *"The Theme of Despair in the Poetry John Donne."* Not lightweight stuff!

Dave went on to teach English Literature and Composition at Lycoming University in Williamsport, Pennsylvania and taught later at Normandale and North Hennepin Community Colleges. That was Dave: always thoughtful, wondering, patiently explaining, helping others to understand.

He was not only smart, Dave was a husband to Sally for over 60 years and a father to Martha, Nate, and Mike. Dave loved family gatherings and there would often be a moment when he would sidle up to Sally and proudly say, "Look! Look at what we did!" Sally and his family were the joy of Dave's life!

And Dave cared, not just for his family, but for others. For 32 years of sobriety until his death, Dave participated and led in Alcoholics Anonymous. There had been many along the way that were able to make it through another night because of Dave when nobody else noticed or cared.

Dave was a man of faith. He knew and he trusted that his comfort—our comfort—in life and in death, is <u>not</u> a straight "A" report card but in our faithful Savior, Jesus Christ. Dave loved the hymn, "O Day Full of Grace" and we sang it at his service. This was Dave's way of telling us that his hope wasn't based on his goodness; it was based on Christ's goodness and grace.

Thanks be to God for the gift of Dave. And thanks be to God who gives us all the victory through Jesus Christ, Our Lord.

# Devotion: Awe Breaks

I love living in the city: the energy, the pace, the people. I love being able to walk to the grocery store or catch the light rail to the airport. I love the bustle of students near where we live by the University.

But there's a downside: I miss being by the ocean

or in the mountains. For a few years now, we've headed to the beach for a few days in the winter. A day there consists of reading, walking, swimming, eating, reading some more, and some card games before bed. We spend most of the day outdoors.

I have found that one good way to begin a day at the ocean, or anywhere, is with a psalm or two. Psalm 136, for example: "O give thanks to the Lord, for he is good, for his steadfast love endures forever. . . . who made the great lights, . . . the sun to rule over the day, . . . the moon and stars to rule over the night." Here is how Stephen Mitchell rephrases Psalm 136: "Give thanks to the unfathomable.....whose miracles greet us every morning (A Book of Psalms: Selections Adapted from the Hebrew).

As I write that sentence, I look out the window at the blooming trees with all the fresh shades of green in the spring, and the blue, blue sky. The cardinal flitting around the bush. The blooming



tulips. I just watched for maybe 10 minutes.....amazed, grateful.

In a past summer edition of *Weavings*, Gunilla Norris writes: "*Many of us are juggling so many things that we are run by our lives rather than living them as gifts from God. What if we could* 

> learn to stop for a moment many times a day? What if in those moments we could decide to notice the sheer miracle of being alive? We would then be taking awe breaks instead of coffee breaks."

Yes, Jesus is "image of the invisible God." But earth—the beach, the mountains, and yes, even the city—is also crammed with heaven. The touch of the Creator is seen (incomplete yes; harsh, sometimes) in creation. God is present in the rhythms of the world, in the wonder of May, the vastness of a starry night, a 4-year-old's energy and curiosity, and the smile of a stranger on a city sidewalk.

Give thanks to the Lord, whose miracles greet us each morning.
