

Where Two or Three Are Gathered

The decline of church attendance in America has making headlines been recent years. This news doesn't really surprise me; I've seen it and been reading about it for years. My most recent reading gives two reasons for this decline: 1) a loss of cultural support for congregational life and 2) the increasingly busy lives we lead.

As for the first reason, it's not that we live in a culture that is hostile to Christianity, it's just kind of indifferent. For three centuries, leaders from Benjamin Franklin to Dwight Eisenhower David publicly encouraged people to go to church. But Sunday is no longer a time reserved for worship and rest for many in our culture. As for the second reason, weparticularly our children—are scheduled to the max, and that includes Sunday mornings. I was surprised last Sunday to hear from a grandparent that their children and grandchildren were not in church because of a birthday party—on Sunday morning at 11:00! Combine this kind of scheduling with the 24/7 availability of entertainment, information, and social

interaction of social media and the internet, and Sunday worship finds itself in competition for our time.

While Peace has felt these changes in ways that affect scheduling and attendance at worship and programs, we are holding our own. Why? Yes, we have tradition do a meaningful worship, music, and preaching. But woven through all ministry is that Peace cares in growing relationships among people. Through activities and ministries like Loaves & Fishes, Older Adult gatherings, Bible Studies, Confirmation, more, we intentionally provide opportunities for people to grow together in both friendship and faith.

These kinds of relationships have always been important, but never more so than in our current time. Authentic relationships matter! Martin Luther once declared that, "As for myself, I judge the loss of all one's possessions easier to bear than the loss of one faithful friend." Luther also believed that "the mutual conversation and consolation of the faithful"—what we might call Christian fellowship-was,

along with preaching and the sacraments, one of God's chief ways of manifesting grace and love.

So when you are pressed for time on a Sunday, or when the kids are sleepy from full schedules, or when you're wondering whether to drive over to church on a chilly October morning, keep in mind the life that Christian community and fellowship offers. More now than ever, we find comfort and courage in each other's company, and in this way bear witness to the truth of Jesus' promise, "for where two or three gathered in my name, I am there." (Matthew 18:20)



In September and early October, we'll revisit some of the great stories we first heard in Sunday School; among them Daniel in the lion's den, Noah and the flood, Jesus welcoming the little children. How we understand these stories now will look a bit different than when we first heard them. Join us for "Sunday School Stories for Adults."

In October, we'll shift our focus to the book of Psalms. In church, we often talk about the great beliefs of the Christian faith: beliefs in Jesus, beliefs about resurrection, sin, and the cross. In this study, we turn to the emotions and feelings of faith. With some of the Psalms, we'll look how the human heart works—about fears, doubts, guilt, and grief.

As we move toward Advent and Christmas, we will—with the help of Paul and his letter to the Colossians—look at who Jesus is for us and for the world. Who is this one who came, and what did he come to do? We'll find out in Colossians!



Service & Mission

Spotlight On....Harvest Pack



In this regular feature, we highlight an organization that Peace supports

with your benevolence dollars through the Service & Mission Committee. This fall we focus on Harvest Pack.

Why Does Peace Support Harvest Pack?

Harvest Pack's mission is simple: healthy food on every table. They envision a world where healthy food is accessible to everyone, regardless of where they were born or how much money they have; a world where people come together to help one another simply because it is the right thing to do.

Their mission aligns with Peace's Service & Mission Committee's mission: to serve and support both small and large-scale projects of local, national, and international ministries responding to human needs. We are the hands and feet of Christ and "doing" as Christ would have us do.

What is Harvest Pack?

Founded in 2012, Harvest Pack is a 501 (c)(3) hunger relief organization. They address food insecurity by distributing the meals that we pack through local schools and food shelves including VEAP.

Hunger is a significant health risk and hunger related issues spill over into many aspects of life such as education, safety and mental health. According to the USDA, in 2020, approximately 50 million Americans suffered from food insecurity, including more than 17 million children in the U.S.. (Food insecurity defined by the USDA is "a household-level economic and social condition of limited or uncertain access to adequate food.")

Because Harvest Pack knows hunger impacts children more than others, they ensure that their meals are distributed to local schools. They partner with school counselors and backpack programs to put food on every student's table.

Oatmeal Packs

Peace's meal packing event entails packing fortified instant oatmeal.

Food shelves communicated to Harvest Pack that they needed nutritious breakfasts so Harvest Pack formulated the most nutrient-rich oatmeal available. This oatmeal provides daily essential vitamins and minerals, is soy and GMO-free, flavorful, and comes in pouches with 8 servings each.

How is Harvest Pack Supported/Funded?

In 2022, the latest tax reports available, 97% of revenue came from contributions, grants, meal packs, and packing events.

How Is Peace Currently Involved and How Does Your Offering Help?

On Sunday, November 10, our congregation will once again put meals together for Harvest Pack. Last year your gifts allowed us to contribute \$4,500 toward ingredients and we packed 15,000 meals in about one hour.

An Interview with Dave Dynneson

In this issue of Partners, we have the privilege of telling Dave Dynneson's story... a story about the military, war, and faith.

Born in Sidney, MT, in 1945, a twin with three older

brothers, Dave "escaped" the dairy farm and went to Dana College in Blair, NE, graduating with a business degree in 1966. college, his military "deferred" status changed to "draftable" and he was given two weeks to find a service. He joined the Army under the College-Opt plan and after 10months of training was commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant of Infantry.

His first assignment was as a Training Officer at Ft. Lewis, WA, training recruits as he had been trained a year earlier. This was followed by the formation of a battalion destined for Vietnam. He was given a platoon of 43 men to train and lead.

On April 8, 1968, Dave and his soldiers boarded a plane bound for Vietnam. After a few weeks of in-country training, Dave recalled his first encounter with the enemy. "It was night, and



had just finished digging in when we started taking fire. I was scared, and hugged the ground, thinking my buttons were awfully thick. Moments later, my CO came on the radio, and 'calmly'

told me to move my platoon to the flank of the enemy and then pour on the fire. He had never been that calm in training; it really jolted me. I quickly did as he said, as we had been trained to do, and we survived."

"On June 3, 1968, my former platoon came under a very heavy attack by the NVA. I was in the Command and Control helicopter with my Battalion Commander, circling overhead, and listening as the battle raged. Led by my former Platoon Sargent, they were in the thick of it, and I was stuck in that helicopter, unable to help. I begged to be let down to lead my platoon, but the CO said he needed me more where I was. That day four of my men were killed. It was the longest day of my life."

Later that summer, Dave got his platoon back after his replacement was killed in action. On his first night back,

his platoon was hit with a mortar attack and he was slightly wounded. Not wanting to lose his platoon again, his medic patched him up. Three months later, he and four of his men sustained "million dollar wounds" and were evacuated to Japan. For that, he was awarded the Purple Heart. He had taken 43 men to Vietnam: 12 remained after he was wounded....1968.

"In June, 1970 my service obligation was up and I left the Army, getting a job with Dun & Bradstreet in Denver. Seven months later, I received a 3 x 5 card in the mail stating the Army was having a Selective Recall to Active Duty and would I be interested. By then, I knew I didn't like what I was doing with D&B, so I put an X in the box saying I was interested and two months later got orders for Fort Riley, KS. As I left D&B I finally had enough nerve to ask my future wife for a date. She figured, what the heck...a free meal. I figured, if she said no, I would never have to see her again. Fortunately, she said yes, and 2 ½ years later we were married."

After returning to the Army, and assignments both stateside and in Europe—including a 3-year tour in the Pentagon where both he and Nancy worked—

they eventually retired to California after 26 years and 18 days. He started as a Private and finished as a full Colonel.

"From Officer Dave savs, Candidate School on, I never doubted God's hand in my life and His guardian angels. I survived Vietnam in 1968, the bloodiest year of the war, when 87% of my fellow platoon leaders were either killed or severely wounded. During my career I went down in three helicopter crashes, but never got a scratch. None of that was by chance or accident. Jesus walked with me then, and still does now. I was spared, and I know it. I have a deep sense of obligation to serve Him and do what my fellow soldiers never got the chance to do....live a life worthy of being spared. It's my daily prayer. Some days I fail miserably, but I have those moments where I know, he has let me be His hands and feet, and those are worth all the times where I fail."

Dave's faith runs deep and he employs Christian practices daily. He and Nancy attend church weekly as well as Wednesday Bible studies. They walk 1 ½ miles each morning using that time to pray. ("A past choir director taught us to use our dog walking time as prayer time...it's a great way to start the day.")

Some of the important lessons that Dave has learned are that "Jesus is always with me, even when I forget. In my impatience, I sometimes think He needs my help so I jump ahead with my solutions. The truth is, He really doesn't need my help and His timing is always better than mine. God gives me daily opportunities to serve Him and puts people...and dogs...in my path to cheer me on. I just need to listen, and then DO!"

What advice would Dave share with our youth? Find an occupation that allows you to serve; be in service to others. Don't waste a minute doing what doesn't fit you. God gave you incredible skills and abilities. Use them in service to Him. Ask for His guidance every morning. Life is short. Don't waste it.

And last, what is Dave's favorite hymn? "Be Still My Soul" sung to melody, *Finlandia*.

Serving God, our country, and those in need is Dave's calling and you can see that in Dave's actions right here at Peace. Our humble and gracious Dave reminded me, "Please don't make me out to be any kind of hero. The only hero in my stories is God. Jesus is my hero and I owe Him my life....no exaggeration."



Devotion: *Climbing Trees*

"Jesus entered Jericho and was passing through it. A man was there named Zacchaeus; he was a chief tax collector and was rich. He was trying to see who Jesus was, but on account of the crowd he could not, because he was short in stature. So he ran ahead and climbed a sycamore tree to see him, because he was going to pass that way."

(Luke 19:1-4)

This story doesn't tell us if Zacchaeus climbed trees often. It just says Jesus was coming, the streets were mobbed, Zacchaeus was short and didn't want to miss out, so he climbed a tree. Maybe no one spotted him, Zacchaeus the tax collector, up there in his sycamore tree. Or maybe they did and laughed and pointed at him.

Jesus didn't laugh, though. He looked up through the branches at the man peering down at him and told Zacchaeus to come down.

"Besides," Jesus said, "you've got dinner plans, Zacchaeus. I'm coming to your house, and salvation is too." Zacchaeus had a change of heart that day and his life, presumably, was never quite the same.

We could rejoice at that and stop here. Unless this isn't so much a story as an invitation, and we're supposed to join him up there. Maybe up a tree with Zacchaeus is exactly where we need to be right now or need to be willing to go. As people of faith, we spend our lives trying to see Jesus: in Scripture, in the world, in the people we live and work alongside. Trying to see Jesus, just like Zacchaeus.

And like him, we have to work for it, because Jesus is always on the move, passing through Jericho and the towns where we live and the stories we read in the Bible. We're told that "where two or three are

gathered" Jesus is in the midst of them, but in the church, it's usually a crowd, with one or two standing in front of us. We're trying to see Jesus, and we're too short, all of us. And sometimes we just leave it there. The meeting ended badly. The conversation broke down. I couldn't find the words. I couldn't get through. Will it always seem

like this; like Jesus has disappeared?

But there are other days. And maybe we remember the problem isn't the people standing in front of us or the walls between us. It might be where we're standing, and if we stood somewhere else, we might see things differently—if we climbed a sycamore tree, for example. None of this treeclimbing would be necessary if Jesus were easy to see—in the Bible, in our lives, in one

another. But Zacchaeus is bold. There isn't anywhere he won't look. There isn't anything he won't climb to see Jesus.

Maybe Zacchaeus is on to something. What if we were to approach every story in the Bible, every conversation, every relationship, with that sort of boldness as a gift the Risen Christ has to offer? Jesus looks up, calls us down from the tree, and then comes over for dinner. Jesus invites himself into our homes and unfinished conversations, to sit down and break bread and shed light on what we might not see. He brings salvation to our homes—to us.

The church is a good place to practice this every time we gather. And what is each new day, if not a chance to climb a lot of trees?
